Materials:


- Scissors or X-Acto knife
- Empty juice carton
- Soil
- Plant or seeds
- Decorating materials (paper, coloring pencils, etc.)
- Glue or tape



Step 1:

Take a pair of scissors or an X-Acto knife and cut out one side of your juice carton to create a large opening.






Step 2:

Fill your juice carton part way with soil, put your plant into the carton and add enough soil to cover the entirety of your plant. If you choose to plant seeds fill your container all the way with soil and follow directions on your seed packet for planting.

Step 3:

Take some scrap paper and attach it to your container. You can decorate one side or all sides if you want to be creative!
