The challenges of 2020 were difficult to say the least, but we adapted and are stronger than ever! We look forward to what the future brings!



We hosted 9 summer and 2 fall interns. They volunteered more than 2,500 hours and gained valuable experience in research and education.



Our research continued by successfully implementing our new digital data collection system. This allowed for less data entry time and errors and quicker results and reporting.

Three all-day survey cruises and 127 public whale watch trips were conducted, educating nearly 5,000 socially-distanced passengers. Over 50

humpback whales (including 4 new calves) were documented. Amazing trips included the magical day when both Spoon and Chablis breached (photo to the left)!



A record number of sea turtles were sighted! Above is a leatherback turtle feasting on a lion's mane jelly.



New beach cleanup protocols were developed and electronic data collection was implemented to reduce the amount of materials and "touch points" during cleanups. We saw PPE at nearly every cleanup...



Programs went virtual! From virtual happy hours and brainstorming sessions to film screenings, art contests and interactive microplastics labs, we kept spreading the word about the importance of protecting marine life.
